



- Unnatural, unpermitted, nonexempted dry weather flows
- Increases with imperviousness
- Carries increased pollutant loads
- Inefficient water practices exacerbate runoff
- Runoff alters creek flows which alters:
 - Morphology
 - Water quality
 - Ecological health and function




