

NATIVE PLANTS ARE THE FOUNDATION OF OUR ECOSYSTEMS The basis of our food webs upon which all life depends.



Soil Amendment - Many native plants thrive in what we consider poor soil conditions! Add organic compost or worm castings to promote healthy soil AVOID chemical fertilizers and other amendments. Boulders Bird Feeders Bench Mulch - Retain moisture, feed your soils, and insulate your plants from heat and cold. + Use organic, weed free, well-composted mulch with a fine to medium texture. Apply after planting, and in late spring and early fall. AVOID wood chips, large pieces of bark mulch, and synthetic materials. They deprive your soil and plants of nutrients. · AVOID weed doths, plastic, and other weed barriers. They prevent the natural cycle of nutrients through the soils, can kill the living biology in your soil, and are often ineffective at preventing weeds. 
